

A community member once said to me, “it’s how Kinship has shown up for me that made the difference in my life.”

How we show up. That’s what makes the difference at Kinship. Our lead volunteers and staff are not just here to “help those in need”. We have a deep hunger to be in community

ourselves, to give and to receive, to welcome and to be welcomed in return.

2023 tells us several stories. One is a story of increased need—Kinship saw a 40% increase in new shoppers in our market due to pandemic related benefits ending.

This past year also tells the story of increased engagement. Households deeply engaged in our programs increased by 38%. Shoppers also volunteered 6,750 hours, that’s one quarter of the total 27,000!


There is a correlation between engagement data and the countless stories of transformation like David’s on page five. Our market, our delicious café meals, the culinary events at our urban farm, and other aspects of our work create the context for social connectedness and trust. When love and trust grow, we show up for each other differently.

In 2023 we saw dozens more stories of people showing up in extraordinary ways—asylum seekers getting settled, pregnancy crises being averted, records getting expunged for employment, families facing eviction getting help to put their stuff into storage, seniors suffering with dementia finding support. The list goes on.

It’s how we show up. When someone knows you mean it, that you’ll show up for them, that you love them and need them in your life...new beginnings become possible.



THE SITUATION:

1 in 3 of our shoppers have someone in their home living with a dietary-related illness like Type 2 Diabetes or High Blood Pressure.

WHAT WE KNOW:

Food is the Entry Point.

Expanding food access and education provides opportunities for people to become more deeply engaged around their health.

OUR IMPACT:

89% of community members say they are now cooking at home as a result of shopping at Kinship.

THE SITUATION:

Social isolation is 6 times more likely to affect low-income households, worsening the effects of poverty.

WHAT WE KNOW:

A sense of belonging and acceptance creates a culture of mutuality enabling us to build trusting relationships.

OUR IMPACT:

96% of community members say they feel accepted in our community at Kinship.

I love people today more than I used to. I love me today more than I used to.

“When I first started coming here, I came just to see what I could get. But all these individuals started coming up to me, giving me hugs and telling me they’re glad I’m here. I was like, wait a minute, I don’t know you. From then on, I started to open up. To have someone tell you how much they care about you, how much they love you, that was hard for me. I’m from the streets, I did fifteen years in prison, and I had a hard time with my addiction. I kept coming back, trying to figure out, why did you care about me so much?”

When I was evicted, I came here early on a Saturday and told Natalie I lost my place and was living under a bridge. She immediately said, we are going to figure something out. Kinship made the call to Milwaukee Rescue Mission and once I was in the program I had to let go, I had to surrender. When I look back on it, having people tell me how much they cared about me and seeing something in me that I couldn’t see in myself made all the difference.”

David continues to work on his sobriety, is close to finding his own stable housing, and has a steady job as a custodian. When asked about his journey of ups and downs, which he points out is far from over, he credits Kinship for walking alongside him through it all.

Mission Internship

We welcomed 8 new Mission Interns to our team this past August! In the Mission Intern program, young adults live a life of service for one full year, working at the Food Center and living in the neighborhood where they serve. Focused on prayer and community in the Catholic tradition, the Mission Interns help run operations and develop relationships within the community.

Their work here always changes depending on the needs of our community, from helping displaced families move, to coordinating Feast Meals, and picking up more than 1,000 boxes of donated cereal!

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Kinship has helped with rides, getting me to the hospital, helping me with my kids, getting them to their appointments, it's just outstanding.


“We were at a shelter when I first came here for food and resources. At the time, I had three kids, one on the way, and my wife has epilepsy. I didn't have a job or a house after two brain surgeries. I went from having a masonry job to having nothing. I mean, we had no money. For three months straight, Kinship was working around the clock and I was busting my butt to

literally pay the fees for three or four housing applications. My Stride Mentor Fred was driving me to all my appointments, driving my kids, and walking me through applications. One time, my furnace went out and Stride even showed up making sure my whole family was okay. It's just ridiculous how much love they show everybody here.”

Gary is still navigating how to provide for his family while his health challenges prevent him from holding a job. Team Stride's referrals to other resources as well as countless day-to-day efforts have kept Gary and his family out of various dire circumstances, for which they are forever grateful.

Kinship officially launched its Workforce Development Program in 2023.

The program disrupts generational poverty by walking alongside individuals facing complex barriers to steady employment and economic mobility.

Feast


COLLABORATIVE MEALS




